

A Note from Our Executive Director



Dear Community,

It is with great pleasure that my colleagues and I present you with Richmond Promise's 2022 Annual Report.

Like many people and organizations around the world, 2022 presented Richmond Promise an opportunity to reconnect with our community in ways that we had not fully been able to since the start of the pandemic.

The year marked the return of in-person College Access programming in high schools which played an important role in increasing financial aid completion rates after a decline during COVID-19. We held our first in-person Scholar Celebration since 2019 and sent students off to college with a crowd of community members cheering them on. And we returned to college campuses to engage with our Scholars and key campus partners who help our students succeed in higher education.

While 2022 was the year that we returned to important in-person work, it was also a year filled with new ventures and opportunities. We hosted our first-ever 5k Fun Run which attracted hundreds of Scholars, families, and supporters who helped us raise awareness for our work. Our organization launched a new partnership with the City of Richmond's Employment and Training Department that helps Richmond Promise alumni gain career-building experience by working in city offices. We also made important investments in our organization's future by creating several new staff positions that will help build our public relations presence, expand development fundraising and initiatives, strengthen our internal operations, and deepen our impact and engagement with students.

Personally, 2022 was significant because it was my first full year as executive director of our organization. As Richmond Promise's new leader, I dedicated much of my time to learning about the students we serve and the higher education community that we are a part of. Some of my favorite moments of the year include calling students on the phone to introduce myself as the new executive director, hosting group dinners with students to get to know about them and their experiences in college, and connecting with higher education partners locally and around the country.

I remain incredibly grateful to serve Richmond Promise Scholars everyday, and for the opportunity to advance higher education access and success in my hometown. I hope you enjoy reading our updates from 2022.

OUR MISSION

Richmond Promise aims to ensure all students in Richmond excel to and through higher education, reach their career goals, and become leaders in their community.

Richmond Promise is a community-wide postsecondary access and success initiative that is actively building a college graduating culture in Richmond, California. We believe that all Richmond students should have the opportunity to develop their skills and reach their full potential, regardless of race, family income, or background. That belief is central to our work and guides us everyday.

Our efforts are driven by the desire to meaningfully and intentionally support Richmond youth to help them achieve their dreams. Richmond Promise engages with students as early as middle and high school facilitating college awareness and access programming in classrooms — to and through their postsecondary education, and as they prepare to enter the workforce. Our wraparound services include: financial aid and admissions workshops, an annual \$1,500 scholarship (renewable for up to six years of a student's postsecondary education), college success programming that incorporates one-on-one coaching and access to on-campus support to help ensure they persist to earn their degrees and certificates, basic students needs supports, and mentorship and paid internship opportunities to build professional skills and develop their resumes.

By creating pathways to and through college, we are working toward a future where Richmond supports its young people to learn, grow, and thrive as positive leaders who can excel in the world and give back to the community that shaped them.

We are deeply honored and grateful to have extended the opportunity of joining the Richmond Promise community to over 3,000 Scholars to date! The Richmond Promise Scholarship allows us to directly invest in our Scholars' futures at any not-for-profit two-year college, four-year college, and/or Career Technical Education program in the United States. Our scholarship of \$1,500 per academic year for up to six years may be used to cover any and all costs of college attendance.



College Access

Turning Classroom-Based Engagement into Results



Working directly in the classroom is a key part of Richmond Promise's approach to college access. **The arrival of College Access & Scholarship Operations coordinator Minhal Hanif (an RP alum herself) in 2022 allowed RP to return to 100% in-person programming for the 2022-23 school year**, and her work helped to yield immediate results as each school that received in-classroom instruction showed an increase in financial aid applications completed.

Scholar Success

College Promise 2.0 Update

As part of the College Promise 2.0 Initiative, Richmond Promise partnered with the Kresge Foundation to support equitable postsecondary pathways at community colleges. **This led RP to partner with the Contra Costa College First Year Experience (FYE) program and provide support to 73 students, 65 of which are part of the Kresge grant.**

As part of this partnership, Richmond Promise and Contra Costa College staff collaborated to provide:



Bi-weekly study sessions

In-class support for English & Math



Monthly campus resource workshops



One-on-one coaching



Beyond12 virtual coaching



Computers that ensure tech access As a result of this partnership, **81% of participating Richmond Promise students completed the FYE program with an average unit count of 18.4 and an average grade-point average (GPA) of 2.88.**

89% of those students, as well as 94% of the Kresge cohort, persisted the following term.

RP College Days

In the fall of 2022, Richmond Promise established College Days that featured campus visits to nearby colleges and universities. The team visited Scholars and campus partners at UC Berkeley, UC Merced, Berkeley City College, Contra Costa College, Diablo Valley College, San Jose State University, and San Francisco State University. Through College Days, we build community with Scholars, partners, and oncampus department heads. Campus visits include presentations by transfer centers, Educational Opportunity Programs (EOP), financial aid departments, tutoring services, and learning communities.

Wraparound Support All Year Long

Summer Bridge

Preparing Scholars to join the routines of higher education takes place through Summer Bridge programming. Richmond Promise-specific workshops and peer mentor conversations address essential document submission, RP resource awareness, financial aid, and more.

Tech Exchange

Technological access serves as a core component of RP's basic needs support system. Participating Scholars are quaranteed device and connectivity access via 4CD's loaner program and services from RP's partnership with local tech-equity focused nonprofit Tech Exchange. **During the 2022-23** school year, 55 computers were provided to students who needed them.

Health Career Connection

Richmond Promise collaborated with Health Career Connection to place 10 students into paid public health internships in Richmond. Participants served for 10 weeks and provided support to organizations like Lifelong Medical Care Center, Healthy Contra Costa and Rotacare Clinic.

Career & Alumni Success

Meet RP Mentor David Padilla & Mentee Ramón Zermeño

As a mentor, what have you learned and/or gained from your mentee while participating in the program?

David: As a mentor, I have gained invaluable insights from my mentee while participating in the program. Ramón's passion and determination to better his community inspire me and reinforce the importance of providing mentorship to early career professionals. Through my participation, I rediscovered the joy of mentoring and the impact it creates for both mentors and mentees.

From your perspective as a mentee, how impactful can a mentorship program be for Richmond Promise Scholars?

Ramón: A mentorship program like this one can be impactful to Scholars because it can help them grow as they transition into their career life. This program helped me find balance between my career and my personal life. It can also help Scholars enhance different skills such as building your resume, knowing how to build a resume, and tailoring it to the job you are looking for, among other things! Why would you recommend an RP Scholar or professional engage in the mentorship program?

David: Because of the lasting impact that this program has on participants, I highly recommend that community leaders, young professionals, and industry leaders join the program as mentors. This is an incredibly rewarding experience that allows you to give back, inspire, and join a larger effort towards positive community change. In doing so, you have the opportunity to help cultivate the future generation of Richmond leaders.

Ramón: This mentorship program helped me realize that some of my weaknesses can be refined and tweaked to become strengths. It also helps you create a bigger network, and whether you use that for your career goals or just to get to know other people, this program definitely allows you to use your voice to engage with like-minded people in Richmond who all want to succeed and bring others with them!

Lifting Richmond's Next Generation of Leaders



In 2022, Richmond Promise entered into a new partnership with Richmond YouthWORKS that places Richmond Promise alumni and Scholars into local job opportunities. The job placement partnership will have an initial duration of three years and will include interview technique workshops, employment opportunity workshops, and other support services. Through the program, Richmond Promise Alumni have interned for the Richmond City Council, Richmond Fire Department, RichmondWorks and the City Attorney's Office.
